

# Welcome to the 2016-2017 NOHS Bands!

We are very glad that you have chosen to be a part of the North Olmsted Bands for the 2016-2017 season. This school year brings with it many opportunities for musical growth and achievement. In addition, we hope that you find your time in band to be enjoyable, challenging, and rewarding as we *work hard to be our best*!

As we look ahead, it is necessary to provide basic information about how the band operates. This handbook has been prepared so that you and your parents will know the requirements, expectations, and procedures of our cooperative group. Read the enclosed information carefully, and refer to the handbook when questions arise. Please be aware that, because we are a group that depends on each of its members for success, it is absolutely necessary that each band member follows the procedures and expectations that this handbook discusses.

## Instrumental Music Department Mission Statement

It is the goal of the North Olmsted Instrumental Music Department to build a highly successful instrumental music program which is rooted in long held traditions, and places well rounded student growth, musical excellence, and student enjoyment as the primary objectives.

#### Course Syllabus/Course Offerings

In the fall, every band member is expected to be a part of the NOHS Marching Band. During this time, band members focus their efforts on the development of marching and musical performance skills with the goals of uniformity, precision, and excellence.

In November, at the conclusion of football season, the band will be divided into two separate ensembles: Symphonic Band and Wind Ensemble. Membership in these groups will be determined by audition. All students enrolled in band will be placed in one of these two ensembles. Regardless of ensemble, all NOHS band students should expect a first-rate musical experience that exposes them to a variety of high-quality music.

In addition to marching and concert bands, students may choose to participate in the following ensembles:

NOHS Jazz Ensemble is an extra-curricular group which is open to all students based upon interest and instrumentation needs. Depending upon these factors, auditions may be held. Jazz ensemble rehearses after school from 3:30-5:30pm on Mondays and Thursdays starting in November. Please see Mr. Kalish for more information.

The NOHS Pep Band is an extra-curricular group that performs at home NOHS Basketball games and other selected events. All currently enrolled NOHS band students are welcome!

The District 4 & 7 Honors Band is a group of highly qualified musicians from Cleveland that our top performing students have the opportunity to participate in. This takes place the weekend of November 11th and 12th, 2016 at CSU. Please see Mr. Kalish for more information.

Greater Cleveland Solo and Ensemble Contest is on January 28th, 2017. Students have the opportunity to participate in this yearly chamber music contest. All students who are participating in private lessons are highly encouraged to participate. Any students who may be interested in this event should see Mr. Kalish in October or November to choose music and begin preparation.

#### Band Member Expectations

Each of the expectations below promote RESPECT and RESPONSIBILITY. Please adhere to them:

- 1. **BE THERE.** All band members are expected to attend all rehearsals and performances. The attendance policy for the NOHS Bands is detailed on the next page.
- 2. **BE ON TIME.** All band members must be in their assigned room when the bell rings. Two (2) minutes after the bell, all students must be in their assigned seats (or Parade Block). Failure to comply with either deadline will result in a consequence deemed appropriate by the directors and commensurate with the seriousness of the issue.
- 3. **BE PREPARED.** Each student is expected to come to band with all necessary materials and equipment each day.
  - •Pencil...VERY important
  - •Flip folder/lyre (Required of ALL instrumentalists during Marching Band)
  - •All necessary sheet music
  - •Brass Instruments: Valve oil, slide grease, soft cloth (Please get your own.)
  - •Woodwind Instruments: Extra reeds, swab, cork grease
  - •Percussion Instruments: Drum sticks, mallets, practice pad, stick bag
    - <u>These will be available for purchase at school and will be required of each</u> percussionist. Specific equipment needs (brands, etc.) will be detailed on a separate form.

•Marching Band Leaders must have their squad binder at all rehearsals.

- 4. **BE RESPONSIBLE.** Students are expected to properly use, store, and care for instruments, music, uniforms, and other materials. Specific procedures for this will be discussed in class.
- 5. **BE A GOOD CITIZEN.** As with any other class, NOHS rules apply to us. In addition, a few "band-specific" regulations are listed below:
  - •Gum, food, and drinks are not permitted in the band room (except plain water)
  - •All instruments and music must be stored correctly after every rehearsal
  - •Improper use, misuse, or abuse of equipment will not be tolerated
  - •Follow expectations and guidelines for football games and other performances. These will be discussed separately.
  - •Consequences for failure to follow rules will include:
    - Verbal warning/on field discipline action
    - After class discussion between student and teacher
    - Detention (Cleaning Duty)
    - Conference with parent
    - Office referral

# Attendance Policy

Because our group can function at full strength only when all members are present, all members of the NOHS Bands are expected to attend ALL scheduled events (performances <u>and</u> rehearsals). Please note that students' grade will be negatively affected if they receive an unexcused absence or tardy. Any student who has documented a legitimate excused absence in advance will be given the opportunity to make up the performance or rehearsal by completing an extra assignment. Below is the procedure for documenting all absences. <u>All absences must be documented</u> through the correct "Pink Card" process prior to the absence in order to be "excused".

## Absence Procedure:

- Make every effort to avoid absences through pre-planning.
- In the event of a legitimate, unavoidable conflict, complete a "*Pink Card*" <u>at least two</u> <u>weeks prior to the absence</u>.
  - In the case of <u>serious</u> illness, a form must be completed upon return to school.
- Return the completed, signed form to your director.
- If accepted as an "Excused Absence", complete a make-up assignment (will be assigned by Mr. Kalish)
- If the assignment is "Unexcused", you will be unable to recover lost points.
- This procedure is in effect for both performances <u>and</u> rehearsals (if the absence is an inschool rehearsal, please follow proper school procedures).
- An "Unexcused" absence from a Wednesday night rehearsal results in the student not being permitted to march the show on the upcoming Friday Football Game.

#### \*\*\*Please note that attendance at all summer marching band rehearsals is mandatory.

\*\*\*While we cannot anticipate all possible conflicts which may arise, the spirit of our attendance expectation is that <u>all</u> students attend <u>all</u> band events unless <u>absolutely</u> impossible. In the event of difficult choices/situations, please communicate with directors well in advance.

## Examples of <u>Acceptable</u> Reasons for Absence from Performances/Rehearsals:

•Severe illness

- o Students who are present in school on the day of an event are expected to attend band events that evening.
- •Death in the family
- •Other family emergency
- •Conflicts with other NOHS activities...but must be approved in advance by director

•Unavoidable religious obligations (Please contact the director to discuss approval)

•Wedding Ceremony

## Examples of <u>Unacceptable</u> Reasons for Absence from Performances/Rehearsals:

- Ŵork
- •Rock concert, Indians game, etc.
- •Driving class or in-car hours
- •Family Vacations
- •All other wedding events that are not the ceremony (unless in the wedding party)

## Attendance expectation for NOHS Athletic/Activity Conflicts:

\*\*\*We value the participation of student-athletes in our band, but stress that these students have made a commitment to each organization.

- •Performances/games for one activity take priority over rehearsals/practices of the other.
- •When both groups have practice/rehearsal at conflicting times, it is expected that students share time evenly between both groups.
- •In the event that both groups have performances/games at the same time, communication **<u>between directors/coaches/advisors</u>** shall determine the course of action.

•Student grades will not be affected by excused sports conflicts as long as the absence procedure is followed.

# Grading

Becoming a proficient musician is a life-long journey. Therefore we do not grade based on "how good" a student is at music. Since each student is at a different point in musical skill acquirement, students will primarily be graded on their growth as a musician from the point they begin the grading period to the end of the period. Our goal is to develop *Independent Musicians Creating Quality Performances.* 

Band grades will be reported as A, B, C, D, or F, with + or – indicated as necessary. The general policies and procedures of evaluation of the North Olmsted City Schools shall be followed. The specific objectives and criteria on which the letter grades are based appear below.

# Student Performance Skills (SPS)(30% of Overall Grade)

North Olmsted Band Members strive to improve their own individual music performance skills through structured, meaningful individual practice, as well as through superior work in full band rehearsals. Evaluation will be made by live and recorded playing assessments, throughout the grading period, demonstrating the student's musical growth in the playing of an instrument.

Students will be responsible for showing growth in the following areas of instrumental performance:

# Tone Quality, Intonation, Musicianship, Technique, Rhythm, Articulation, and Performance Factors

Growth will be measured based on a 5 point grading rubric. Students will be evaluated through individual playing assessments. The SPS grade will be calculated observing a student's overall improvement, meeting the goal of improvement in at least one area, and meeting the quarterly goal the student sets. The weight of each performance area will be based on the average difficulty of growth in each area.

A detailed account of the rubric and definitions of terms are available in each student's SPS Spreadsheet in their Google Drive Band Folder.

The SPS Rubrics are based on a 6 year progression from 7th grade through 12th grade. The 5 point scale is also separated in two distinct progression milestones. Year 1 & 2 (Beginning), Year 3 - 6 (Intermediate). Students who progress past a High School ability level will be graded on an (Advanced) 5 point scale. Each student will have a personal file shared in Google Drive that will show their progression as a musician based on these benchmarks. Since it would be unfair and inaccurate to assess a student in their first year as a member of band the same as a member who is in their sixth year, we are using this system in order to accurately represent every student's progress on their instrument. Students will have continual access to their file to see how they are progressing and in which areas they need extra work. A student will receive a superior grade as long as they show moderate overall improvement, improvement in at least one of the different areas of musical growth each quarter, and whether they achieve their quarterly personal development goals.

# Student Musical Understanding (SMU) (20% of Overall Grade)

North Olmsted Band Members strive to improve their music literacy and listening skills. These will be assessed through written theory assignments, quizzes, and tests.

# Students will be responsible to show growth in their understanding of the following areas of music:

Listening (aural) Music Theory Music Terms/Vocabulary Music Genres Music History Growth will be measured based on meeting benchmarks according to the student's year in the SMU curriculum. Progress through and meeting these benchmarks will translate into a grade based on percentage of completion and scores achieved.

# Professionalism (50% of Overall Grade)

Because Band is a performance-oriented class, all members are expected to participate fully and in a professional manner. This includes being on-time, prepared, handing assignments in on time, and contributing as an active and meaningful participant. Evaluation will be determined by inclass record keeping and teacher assessment.

Evaluation of professionalism will be based on the following rubric:

- A Superior: Student consistently demonstrates outstanding effort and a positive attitude, always brings required materials, hands in assignments on time, and participates fully and appropriately at all times.
- B Excellent: Student generally, with few exceptions, demonstrates excellent effort and a positive attitude, brings required materials, hands in assignments on time and engages in appropriate rehearsal behaviors.
- C Developing: Student's effort, preparedness, and/or rehearsal behaviors are inconsistent.
- **D Poor:** Student demonstrates a general lack of effort, frequently comes to activities unprepared for success, and engages is inappropriate rehearsal behaviors.
- F Failing: Student does not participate in class.

#### Honors Option

This year is the third year we have been able to offer an *Honors Option* for band. This is a weighted grade and any student enrolled in band has the option to take the *Honors Option*.

Honors Students are enrolled concurrently with non-honors students and the Honors delineation is in no reflection of student musicianship ability or bears any effect on placement in wind ensemble or symphonic band. To receive the weighted grade, students will be responsible for all the 'normal' coursework for band as well as earning a total of (4) Honors Band Credits per quarter.

## <u>Honors Band Credits</u>

Honors Band Credits are earned by the completion of weighted assignments chosen by the student and teacher. The purpose of these credits is to deeper immerse the student into the music curriculum and to offer opportunities for student exploration into areas of interest in the field of music. The weight of each assignment (.5 - 4) will be decided by the directors based on the time necessary to complete the assignment and the difficulty of the assignment.

#### <u>Weekly Meetings</u>

All Honors Music Students are required to meet with the director weekly to update their progress on their assignments. The designated weekly meeting time is Monday's during the morning SOAR period (7:25-7:55am) Each student needs to reserve this time each week for these meetings. This time will also be used for common interest area instruction, instrument master classes, presentation of research, and honor student collaboration. If a student needs to miss a SOAR meeting, they must coordinate a time to meet with the director outside of class time to make up missed work.

#### **Declaration of "Interest"**

Similar to "declaring a major" in college, each student will select an area of "interest" in music that will focus their Honors Band Credit acquisition.

#### <u>Honors Interest Areas</u> Musicology

Theory Performance Education General Sound Recording Technologies (SRT) There are standard assignments that each area requires as well as some assignments that all areas require. Students need to complete 2 of the 5 assignments from our list of quarterly assignments to fulfill half their credit requirement *and* they need to create their own independent studies that will be approved by the directors to fulfill their last 2 credits. Students must have their "interest" declared by Friday, September 9th. Students need their quarterly assignments chosen by the end of the first week of each quarter.

# <u>Grading</u>

Students will graded on these assignments based on completion and quality of work. A student must receive a passing grade (D or higher) on the assignment to receive the credits associated with the assignment. Each assignment will be weighted based on the number of credits it is valued at to create the full (4) credits required per quarter.

If a student fails to complete all (4) credits in the quarter, a score of '0' will be assessed to the uncompleted credits and will be averaged into the overall grade.

A re-weighting of the overall grades will be as follows to allow for the Honors Credits:

# <u>Student Performance Skills (30% of Overall Grade)</u> <u>Student Musical Understanding (20% of Overall Grade)</u> <u>Professionalism (35% of Overall Grade)</u> <u>Honors Credits (15% of Overall Grade)</u>

# Performance Expectations

## Football Games:

- 1. At the scheduled reporting time, students will be go through a uniform inspection (detailed later in the Handbook)
- 2. The NOHS Marching Band uniform must always be worn properly and entirely unless otherwise directed by Mr. Kalish.
- 3. Play your instrument only as part of the group while in the stands or on the field.
- 4. Please ask your guests to sit outside of the band section and thank them for watching and supporting us.
- 5. Follow directions the first time.
- 6. The 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter is your chance to get refreshments and use the restroom. Please be back in the stands with no less than 1:00 remaining in the 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter so that we can play between the 3<sup>rd</sup> & 4<sup>th</sup> Quarters. <u>Remember: Uniforms stay on during this break!</u>
- 7. Visiting alumni may not be in the stands with students and must remain either with the directors or in the general admission stands (Alumni Game excluded).
- 8. EYES WITH PRIDE! Have pride in yourselves, and also in the football team that represents our school. Your cheers and support are expected.

## **Band Bus Expectations:**

- 1. All students are expected to ride school transportation both to and from all outside performances. (If you need alternative transportation from a performance, please fill out the Transportation Release Form (Yellow Card) available outside the band office).
- 2. Please keep full uniforms on at all times. (Including Hats, gloves and spats) This prevents them from ending up on the ground, and thus getting dirty.
- 3. Please do not have drinks on the bus.
- 4. Students are expected to ride the same bus to and from all games.
- 5. Use common sense and follow directions. Riding a school bus is easy.

# **Concert/Public Appearance Expectations:**

- 1. Out of respect for the efforts of all musicians in the various bands and orchestra, we expect that all students attend the entirety of all concerts. The schedule for each individual performance will be communicated through Charms and will also be posted online at <a href="http://www.eaglemusic.org">http://www.eaglemusic.org</a>
- 2. Be prepared. As always, arrive at performances with all necessary gear.
- 3. Follow school rules. All school rules will apply at all band events.

# Marching Band Uniform Inspection

## Inspection:

Prior to all marching band performances, students will be subject to a uniform inspection. The inspection will occur at the reporting time on the band schedule. At this time, students will meet in parade block, in full uniform, and be called to attention. Band staff will inspect the student's uniform, making sure that all pieces are being worn correctly and that students are not breaking the uniform dress code. (This includes cleanliness of the uniform) If a student's uniform is found unacceptable for performance and it is not possible to remedy the infraction prior to performance, the student will not be permitted to perform on the marching band field with the band and their performance grade will be lowered.

If a student does not pass inspection, students will be permitted to march in with the band to the stadium, perform in the stands during the game, participate in all other band related activities during the game. The alternative assignment for the student to maintain partial credit for their performance grade will be to stand at attention on the sidelines between the 35 and 30 yard lines, towards the north end of the field, facing the band during the field performance. The students will rejoin the band as they march off the field and continue to participate in the remaining band activities for the performance.

It is the personal responsibility of each member of the band to maintain the uniform assigned to them for the entirety of the season.

## Damaged or Soiled Uniform:

If a uniform is found to be damaged due to normal wear or soiled by an accident with food or drink, please inform a NOBOB uniform specialist or staff member to seek repair, replacement, or professional cleaning of the uniform part prior to that weeks performance (preferably at uniform check-in before leaving from a performance). DO NOT expect your uniform to be repaired or cleaned on the day of a performance, plan ahead and give us the week to help you be ready for inspection.

## <u>Lost items:</u>

If you have lost or damaged (beyond repair) one of the uniform pieces you purchased through NOBOB, parents will have these items available for purchase prior to performances. You will not be able to "loan" uniform pieces. Replacement pieces are on a first come/first serve basis, if you know of a need of a new item, it would be a good idea to let staff or NOBOB know ahead of time to order a new part so it available for the performance. Don't forget, being out of full uniform will result in not passing inspection.

# Playing Tests and Memorization of Marching Band Music

## When?

Music Tests will occur during rehearsal time at least two days prior to a performance of the music being tested.

## <u>Section Leaders</u>

Section Leaders will be tested by a Director: If a section leader doesn't pass their music, then a director will test their section. The section leader then will have to be tested individually by a director.

### **Testing Process**

Section Leaders will initially test sections (1st and 2nd parts separately) Students who do not pass the section leader's assessment will have to see a director and test off with them prior to the week's show.

#### <u>Memorization</u>

Memorization on Half-Time Music is the goal this year.

First run through of a test will be done without music.

If there are students who have not passed the music memorized, then the students who didn't pass will be re-tested with music with an emphasis on memorization of the missed parts.

Section Leaders will keep track of Students who didn't pass.

#### <u>Re-testing</u>

A student who has not passed is responsible for scheduling a time with a director to re-test. "not having time" is not an excuse to not test. It is your responsibility to be ready for the initial test, Directors will commit to being here when you are able to test (this can occur during class, lunch, study-hall, and after school SOAR with prior notice.

No re-tests will occur within a half-hour prior to inspection times.

## <u>Not Passing</u>

If a student doesn't pass a playing test and is therefore unable to march with the band on the field, the alternate assignment will be to stand at attention on the sidelines during the show in which the song they didn't pass occurs. Participation in a show requires all songs to be passed in that show. Not passing a playing test will negatively effect the *Professionalism* portion of your grade.

If you are (due to difficulty of the music) unable to play the music based on your current level of musical growth, you need to discuss this with a director prior to the music tests and a separate plan of accommodation will be created for you.

Leaders: Make it your responsibility to ensure your squad passes their music tests.

## Charms "Office Assistant"

We again are using the effective communication, organization, grading, and finance system named Charms. Charms is an online based "office assistant" that was developed specifically with music programs in mind. Each student will receive a unique login that will allow parents and students to login to their student's page where they will have access to a vast array of tools that will allow you to stay up to date with the program. You will be able to see current student balances for their NOBOB account, monies due, upcoming events, volunteer options, assignments, uniforms and instruments checked out, etc...

On the first day of school students will be asked to log-in, update their personal contact information, and at least one parent's personal contact information. Charms allows us to send out instant e-mails, texts, phone call reminders, etc...

## NOHS Band Uniforms

#### Marching Band:

The Summer Uniform:

- NOHS Band Shirt (tucked in)
- Black NOHS Band Shorts
  NOBOB Issued Black sock
- NOBOB Issued Black socks
- Black marching shoes
- Eagle Marching Band Sunglasses (when weather appropriate)

#### The Full Uniform:

- The NOHS Band provides all members with a jacket, trousers, shako (hat), and plume.
- Students are responsible for purchasing the following items, which are available through the Band and Orchestra Boosters:
  - White gloves
  - White spats
  - Black marching shoes
  - Suspenders (if needed based on style of pant)
  - Black socks

#### Wearing the Uniform:

- All students must wear a black or orange shirt underneath the uniform.
- Trousers should be adjusted by turning under the necessary amount of material and then sewing it in place. Never remove any cloth from the uniform. Adjust the length of the trouser legs so that they are **three (3) inches from the floor at the heel of the shoe.**
- Suspenders must be worn to hold the trousers in place.
- Jewelry shall be worn at a minimum while in uniform. A watch and ring may be worn if desired. All students with pierced ears should remove their earrings or wear studs. No visible jewelry may be in colors outside of Orange, Black, or White (gold/sliver are acceptable)
- Bandanas and ski caps are not to be worn underneath the band shako. Ski caps may be allowed due to cold weather at the discretion of the director.
- Sunglasses are only warn at the discretion of the director.
- Fingernail polish should only be in neutral or school colors.

Caring for the Uniform:

- The marching band uniform will be put on, taken off, and stored at NOHS. The uniform must always be hung and stored correctly.
- Student-supplied items (shoes, spats, gloves, socks) should NOT be kept at school. These items *must* be washed by the student prior to each performance.
- The uniforms will be dry-cleaned as necessary by the Band and Orchestra Boosters. The cleaning fees paid at the beginning of the marching band season cover these cleanings.

#### Concert Bands:

The Concert Uniform:

- Gentlemen:
  - Black Tuxedo Provided by NOBOB
  - White tuxedo shirt Purchased by Student
  - Black bow tie & cummerbund Purchased by Student
  - Black Socks and Dress Shoes Purchased by Student (Marching shoes may be worn)
  - Ladies:
    - Black Concert Dress Purchased by student through NOBOB
      - Note: Because dress is machine washable, no cleaning fees will be charged
    - Natural colored hose
    - Black dress shoes (No tennis shoes, flip-flops, or shoes with colors other than black)

Wearing & Caring for the Uniform:

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- The uniform is intended to be worn with no street clothes underneath.
- Uniforms are to be hung up neatly after each performance.

# Physical Conditioning in Marching Band

Marching Band is without a doubt a very physically demanding and strenuous activity. As such, a significant amount of time and energy will be devoted to increasing the physical fitness and stamina of marching band members. This will include such activities as running/jogging, jumping jacks, marching drills, and other calisthenics. In order to prepare yourself for these demands, we HIGHLY RECOMMEND the following:

- •Exercise: Begin prior to the start of marching band season.
- •Hydration: Drink water the night before and regularly throughout the activity.
- •Diet: Be sure to eat a good breakfast each morning. Good food choices are a plus, also!
- •Clothing: Choose clothing, footwear, and hats that are appropriate for the activity. •Sunscreen

In addition, students sustaining injuries or illness during rehearsals or performances, which require them to stop the activity, will receive basic treatment and rest up to an hour. If at that time they are not in a condition to return to band, a parent will be contacted and an individual plan for that student will be developed.

## Use of School-Owned Instruments

Students using school-owned instruments for marching and/or concert seasons are expected to treat them with the utmost care and respect. Students shall be responsible for any damage - beyond normal wear & tear - that occurs to these instruments. In the event an instrument sustains such damage, repairs will be made to the instrument by the school-contracted repairman, and a bill will be sent to the child's parents.

In order to help limit possible damages, here are expectations for those using school-owned instruments:

- •Instrument shall be put away properly after each use, with case latched
- •No extra materials (music, shoes, water bottles, etc.) shall be kept in the case
- •Instrument should be kept clean and well-maintained (oiled, greased, etc.)
- •Student will refrain from horseplay, especially around instruments
- •School instruments may only be used if they are properly checked out by a director.
- •Instruments will be checked back into the inventory at the end of the year and damages will be assessed at check-in.

## Private Lessons & Outside Ensembles

Private lessons are a cornerstone upon which successful music groups are built. We strongly recommend that all students take private lessons with a qualified music teacher. We have found that students taking such lessons are among our most successful young musicians and enjoy the experience of being in band more for having added this additional experience. Individual instruction with a qualified instructor on a student's instrument is beneficial for players of all ability levels, because these lessons focus on a player's own strengths and weaknesses. Lessons are available at many local music stores, as well as with local independent teachers. Please see a director for more information.

In addition, many of our students participate in advanced youth bands and orchestras in the area. Organizations such as Cleveland Youth Wind Symphony, Cleveland Orchestra Youth Orchestra, Contemporary Youth Orchestra, Baldwin-Wallace Youth Orchestra, and Northern Ohio Youth Orchestra can give advanced students a chance to perform with other top musicians from around the region. Auditions for these groups are generally in the spring. See a director for more information.

# Student Leadership

### **Band Officers:**

The Band Officers (President, VP/Treasurer, and Secretary) are responsible for representing the band and providing input when certain decisions concerning the group are made. This group is also responsible for assisting with numerous tasks that arise over the course of the year. In addition, specific duties have been assigned to each of the individual officers. An officer's primary responsibility is to make sure that the *student leaders* are fulfilling all of their responsibilities. Band officers are elected at the end of each year.

- **President:** The Band President is the top student leader for the year. They are the student representative to all NOBOB Meetings. They are responsible for coordination of specific full band events and pre-performance speeches. The President is the direct liaison between the band and the Directors.
- Vice President/Treasurer: The Band Vice President fulfills the President's responsibilities when they are unavailable or unable to do so. They coordinate the "adopt-a-family" charity during the holiday season. The VP coordinates and sells the Band Pops during Band Camp. As Treasurer they coordinate band sweatshirts or tee's and collect money for any student run fundraisers/collections.
- Secretary: The Band Secretary is responsible for taking, entering, and auditing attendance records for all marching band performances and rehearsals. They keep track and enter all earned band points towards lettering. They also maintain the student roster (keep addresses, phone numbers, and other personal information updated in Charms)

#### <u>Drum Major:</u>

The drum major serves as the most visible student leader during the marching season and is the top student leader on the field. The drum major works in numerous capacities, and specific job descriptions will vary from year to year depending on the strengths and other qualifications of the individual student. Duties include coordination of practice field set-ups, bus loading, and conducting the band in the stands. A Drum Major's primary responsibility is to make sure that the *student leaders* are fulfilling all of their responsibilities on the field. Drum majors are selected through an extensive audition/interview process at the end of each school year.

#### Section Leaders:

During marching band season, these individuals serve as squad leaders with the additional duty of being responsible for helping develop musical growth within their sections. Section leaders will periodically rehearse their sections, and they have the authority to schedule sectional rehearsals outside of band time when necessary. Section leaders are expected to attend the Leadership Workshop and all rehearsals. Section leaders are selected through an interview/audition process at the end of each year. A section leader's primary responsibility is to make sure that their *squad leaders* are fulfilling all of their responsibilities.

## Squad Leaders:

During marching band season, these band members are each responsible for an individual squad of band members. The squad leader is charged with the responsibility of helping those in his/her squad with all aspects of marching. Squad leaders will instruct members of their section in marching fundamentals during Fundamentals Rehearsals. Therefore, squad leaders are expected to attend the Leadership Workshop and all rehearsals. Squad leaders are selected through an interview/audition process at the end of each year. A squad leader's primary responsibility is to make sure that their *squadlings* are fulfilling all of their responsibilities.

#### <u>Music Librarians:</u>

The librarians shall be responsible for filing, maintaining, and distributing all music for the various bands. Any music needs (lost music, etc.) should be addressed to the librarians. The librarians are appointed by the directors; all interested students should contact the directors at any point during the year.

#### **Committee Chairs:**

These individuals chair a unique committee in the band that focuses on certain aspects of the band's overall smooth operation.

- **Happiness Chair:** The *Happiness Chair's* main responsibility is to positively affect the band's morale throughout the season. Responsible for coordinating "*WF*" creation. Keeps track of student's happiness cards (student information (birthdays, favorites, etc.)) Coordinating outreach efforts to students going through difficult situations (deaths in family, illnesses, and other hardships).
- **Discipline Chair:** The *Discipline Chair's* main responsibility is to coordinate with the directors and secretary to enforce the expectations in the band handbook. Their duties include development of a committee that will determine appropriate consequences for *minor infractions* (ie. late to band, swearing on the field, littering, etc.) This committee acts as a "peer council" to help ensure the band is held accountable for their actions that negatively effect the performance of the group. All consequences are approved by the directors prior to enforcement. All infractions that are considered severe or in direct violation of school rules will be handled by the directors.
- **Social Chair:** The *Social Chair's* main responsibility is to plan and offer social outlets for the entire band. These activities will be approved in advance by the directors and are to include all members of the band. They will also be in charge of soliciting NOBOB for any funds needed.
- **Memory Chair:** This individual, and their committee, will compile photographs, video, audio, newspaper clippings, etc. in order to create video presentations and scrapbooks of the year's occurrences. In addition, they will catalog concert programs and recordings at the conclusion of each concert. The Band Historians are appointed by the directors; all interested students should contact the directors at any point during the year. They are also in charge of Eagle Marching Band Social Media Outlets.

## Earned Awards in Band

#### **Band Letter:**

The "lyre" monogram is awarded to band members who satisfy the following requirements based on year in high school. Each ensemble a student participates in is equal to 1 credit. There is also a miscellaneous credit possible for students who earn points outside of ensemble participation.

The following is a breakdown of credits needed to earn a Band Letter based on class in school:

1st Year Band Students:	7 credits
2nd Year Band Students:	6 credits
3rd Year Band Students:	4 credits
4th Year Band Students:	1 credits

- 15 Private lessons (1/2 hour 1 hour lessons weekly for the year) (min. 13 lessons with approved teacher on band instrument or piano)
- 10 Band Leadership (section leader, squad leader, section principal)
- 10 "Excellent" rating by band at OMEA State Contest
- 10 Participation in Summer Music or Drum Major Camp
- 10 Participation in Honors Ensembles (each)
- 10 Participation in other local ensembles (NASA Band, community band, church ensemble, etc.) on band instrument. (10 pts. per ensemble)
- 5 Changing instrument for Marching Band/Jazz Band
- 1 Unpaid performances (solo or small ensemble) of substance (max 10/year)
- 50 Maximum points transferred from another school (from current school year)
- 1-10 Extra points awarded by directors

# <u>Silver Pin:</u>

The Silver Pin shall be awarded to those students who earn a 2nd year letter.

# <u>Gold Pin:</u>

The Gold Pin shall be awarded to those students who earn a 3rd year letter.

#### <u> 4 Year Varsity Letter:</u>

The highest award a student can earn is the 4 year Varsity Letter in Band. This is awarded to students who letter all four years in band. This award will be substantial.
